National Clout weekend 2020

2020 sees the National Clout Championships move from its home for the last 12 years, Rawdon Meadows, Bradford, to the Hopgrove Sports Fields in York. This gives me the opportunity to expand the shoot to the whole weekend and introduce a new National Championships, "The Tassel Award Championships".

I must however, first of all thank Bronte Archers for hosting the event over the last 12 years that has seen the attendance grow to a dizzy 177 in the year 2016. It was a big decision to move and hopefully it will prove to be the right decision.

I have been advised via email that a contract to host the National Championships will be awarded for the next 3 years which also gives a little certainty together with the chance to add this further shoot and Championships.

The Sunday will see the Tassel Award Championships with a Metric Clout to be shot. Although not formally raised/agreed with Northern Counties Archery Society, who finance the Tassel Scheme, but I am hopeful that this will just be a formality giving me the opportunity to introduce a new design of medal and/or badge. Maybe even some trophies, if anyone fancies donating/sponsoring one get in contact with me!

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Archer profile—Peter Gregory (aka Mr Clout) - Never give up!

Being a passionate clout addict I thought I'd share my feelings with the rest of you who may be in the same boat I was. For almost 30 years I have travelled the length and breadth of the country entering clout competitions from as far as Devon and Cornwall all the way up to Bannockburn in Scotland, I have seen many changes over the years (all for the better may I say) I've had a great career as a recurve archer, winning everything there is to be won, also at one time holding all 8 National recurve records, then 6 years ago I notice my scores weren't what I

wanted them to be and finding it harder and harder to get good groups, not normally out of the blue and very rarely missing, as a competitive archer this became very frustrating, convincing myself I would work harder over the winter to get back on track.

Another season came and things didn't improve they just got worse, I was punishing myself and getting frustrated with what was happening, the truth being that over the last 45 years of being in the building trade was starting to show, my string fingers were not coming of the string cleanly due to arthritis (too much holding a hammer and saw), it was getting that bad that I was missing the clout more times than hitting it, I was so fed up with myself I said I was packing the sport in, that was 2018, I wasn't doing



much archery and was falling out of love with the sport, I told my archery friends that of 2018 National clout champs I will never shoot a recurve again, in the lead up to the Nationals I thought is this it?? Am I really going to pack in?? What were my options??

Longbow?? Barebow?? None of these are any different to recurve as I still need to get the string off my fingers, the thought of compound sent shivers through my body, I swore I would pack in before I shot one of those, being told by my first club "never go to the dark side" it stuck with me over the years.

I love this sport, I've given too much of my life to it to just pack in and walk away from shooting with my friends.

In October last year I bought my first compound, I'd never shot one before so it was all new to me, I absolutely love it, so much so I wish I'd done it years ago.

It has been a learning curve as you can imagine, 29 years as a recurve archer never having shot a compound, the first clout I tried was a York Archers early in 2019, I had no idea what I was doing or how to aim so I just used point of arrow on flag and hey presto, I won my first clout comp, I couldn't believe it, I thought surely it couldn't be this easy. O my lord the next clout put me back in my place. I came last and over the next three comps I still came last but I'm glad about that because it's made me work harder on understanding this magnificent bow and how to get better scores

Throughout the season of 2019 I've gone from white tassel to gold imperial and red tassel for metric.

Shooting compound has put the life back into me as an archer and I can't wait for 2020 season to start, so anyone reading this whether your a clout, field or target archer and you're on a shooting downer try a different bow style it's certainly kept me in the sport and looking forward to many more years.

Ambitions for 2020, top 5 in the clout rankings, top 3 at the Nationals.

halfway up the field etc., at last here's fresh talent. We yatter on and on about falling junior numbers, how do we get more into the sport and what's been tabled to deflect some of their attention from boys / girls / Gran Turismo / pamper evenings?

I love kids - can't eat a whole one - but mention I have an unfortunate effect on babies; they detect me as some sort of Anti-Christ and my presence will start them howling, often resulting in a severe case of reflux. Moral is, don't hand me one and I don't even know



which way up they go. However, my efforts of encouragement with older children of more robust digestive systems has retained a couple of promising juniors, but it's just a sticking plaster on the wound. Then I saw the light - which at the time seemed like the oncoming locomotive in a tunnel.

I'd inherited the most complex tournament I'd ever seen – two stages, 9 age groups / awards, more trophies than a field shoot and all previous forms on a DTP that I didn't have. Just about to plunge off a cliff I reached the bit in her notes saying "Judges will conduct Clout training just after lunch." Eureka!

I've never come across a Clout – granted one with more fun things at which to aim – exclusively for juniors. For sure the ones I've seen at "serious" Clouts enjoy themselves, but my bunch of 28 juniors had such a ball mullering the hell out of the knights and shields behind the castle walls that the judges had difficulty calling time.

The Agincourt volley at the specially-hatched-for-the-occasion drag-

on was the high spot. Luckily Lord He Who Should Not Be Named" was made out of ballistic foam. A young lady hit his heart first – but we had a boy's trophy as well so the guys had to go again. There was nearly a riot in the girls' camp as they insisted they shot on.

This was just one; we need more events introducing Clout *just for kids*. These can be held over shorter distances which standard-sized shooting grounds can easily accommodate. Enable them to have such a hell of a good time that Clout – not just archery – becomes embedded. Sure, life and those other interests that teenagers insist they invented (of which we old foggies know nothing) will intrude – but it will take longer for drop outs, and they'll come back as young adults.

I didn't plan to take up Archery, a family member came to visit one day and announced he had joined an archery club in Hyde.

By way of polite conversation I mentioned that I had never done any archery, my shooting being of the rifle & pistol sort many years ago.

Thought nothing more of it until a few weeks later I was presented with a Fathers day card with an enclosure for a beginners course starting in a couple of weeks.

As this was a present I had little choice but to attend said lessons.

Week one, yea - yea bows and arrows no accuracy, random hits on a target.

Week two, ah that's more like it – sights on a real take down bow, much better.

Week three, making things difficult now, not got to hold the bow and they made it even heaver to lift with this long rod thing.

Week four, at last its coming together and the arrows are finally in the gold, I now like this very much and agree to join the club there and then, at this point Peter says we have a competition this Saturday, you should come and join in.

I say hold on I'm not that good, he laughs and says "no just come along and see how it all works", I do and I am hooked.

A couple of months in and Peter tells me a group of the guys are going to Kendal to shoot Clout, I ask what that is all about and again I am persuaded to join in just for the one day

I am advised to shoot my recurve bow without sights and long rod in (bare bow) style, which I do and achieve a white tassel award score at my first attempt.

Sadly my application is denied as I incorrectly fill in the form as a recurve bow as that's what I thought it was (just shot bare bow style).

So I am now determined to try again at the earliest opportunity, and I have a new addiction Clout, the next tournament the guys are camping again and are making offers of a loan of a tent, to which I reply "I am not starting sleeping under canvas again at my age (60) "

Six months later I have purchased a trailer tent and all associated camping gear to go with it. I am now mad for Clout archery and go to as many as I can as I am collecting badges quite quickly.

Twelve months on and I not only win the event on Saturday but get a Grand Master Bowman score and the gold badge to go with it, on the Sunday I am still on a high and pop in a six gold end on the metric target. Clearly you don't have to wait years and years to get wins, just be determined to win and practice as much as you can.

Apart from my successes I have been amazed by the friendliness of the other competitors in this sport, not incurring anything like it in other things I have tried.

For someone who you have just beaten for first place to shake your hand slap you on the back and say well done is overwhelming, and its not been an isolated incident either.

I truly wish I had taken up Archery when I was much younger as I know I have missed out on so much fun. I feel so strongly about archery that I took the opportunity to go on a coaching course and have now been teaching beginners our beloved sport.

Ideas for discussion - How about?

<u>National Series</u>—Initial thoughts on this are that I would nominate and award status to say 6 or 7 shoots nationwide that would count towards this, with say 3 or 4 shoots to count for the overall placings. One shoot that would have to be completed would be the end of season Tassel Championships. This series would be open to all archers but only 1 bow discipline per archer would be allowed, by either nomination before the first shoot or taken as the bow discipline at the first series shoot attended.

<u>Masters Tournament</u>—To be held at the National Clout/Tassel Championships in 2020 with both rounds counting towards the awards. The awards would only be available to those archers having attained the standard of Grand Master, Master or Junior Master Bowmen in the preceding year or in the current year prior to the Championship weekend, and having made a valid claim.

Both these shoots would have points awarded for placings from 1st down to 10th in each bow discipline. A suggested format being as follows:

1st—20 points, 2nd—15 points, 3rd—11 points, 4th—8 points, 5th—6 points, 6th—5 points, 7th—4 points, 8th—3 points, 9th—2 points & 10th—1 point.

Let me know what you think about these ideas and if enough feedback/support is received I will make the decision whether to run with it/them.
